- The North Gwinnett Co-Op** food supply is critically low! - The City was excited to receive an important historical document, the first recorded minutes of the very first Sugar Hill City Council meeting after the City was incorporated in 1939. Former Mayor George Haggard presented the ledger to Mayor Gary Pirkle. The ledger was passed down to Mayor Haggard from former Mayor Simon Johnson and was told to keep it in a safe for future generations. It will now be on display in our new City Hall. If you or anyone you know have old photos, documents or memorabilia, please contact City Hall so we may add to our display of Sugar Hill history.
- The Benton House Senior Living Facility held a memorial dedication for a fountain in memory of two of its residents. The fountain and landscaping was donated by the families of Billy Youngblood and Helen Martin (photo). Benton House Director Julianne Custer addressed the residents that had gathered in the garden and several family members spoke and thanked the staff for their care and support for their loved ones.
- Leaves and healthy streams! What do leaves have to do with the health of streams? Leaves that are blown or swept into the street wind up in drainage ditches or storm drains. They are washed into local streams where bacteria causes the leaves to decay and release phosphorus. This bacterial action can lead to a decrease in the water oxygen levels necessary to support the survival of aquatic life. How can you help? Don't blow or sweep leaves into the street, storm drains or drainage ditches. Instead, consider composting the old leaves. If you bag the leaves, the City picks them up free of charge!
- Members of the Sugar Hill Downtown Development Authority attended the Partnership Gwinnett Redevelopment Forum where they had a table display that promoted Sugar Hill's new developments. Highlighted were the new City Hall, the streetscape and the storm water retention pond. A newly designed marketing brochure was handed out to potential developers for our "downtown".
