When it comes to cancer, almost everyone has a story to tell. Whether it is losing a loved one, or kicking cancer to the curb, cancer has impacted millions of lives. There are many organizations that dedicate their time and effort to help finding a cure for cancer and the pain it causes. One of the biggest organizations is Relay for Life, a program that helps communities celebrate the lives of people who have battled cancer, remember lost loved ones, and fight back against the disease. Each year, more than 3.5 million people in 5,000 communities in the United States, along with additional communities in 20 other countries, gather to take part in this global phenomenon to raise much-needed funds. North Gwinnett High School is the number one school Relay fundraiser in the world, with each and every member having a different motivation for "why they relay." Natalie Alvarez relays for "[her] grandma who fought against breast cancer and [her] two grandpas with Prostate and Skin cancer." Alex Hawks relays "for [her] grandma and great grandma, who both had breast cancer and won" and her "great grandpa who passed away from Pancreatic Cancer." Once again, North Gwinnett goes above and beyond for fundraising for Relay.



Last year, North raised \$140,000. This year, their goal is to raise \$150,000. North Gwinnett raises funds by selling t-shirts, having goals for each member, baking, racing in color runs, etc. This year, on Saturday, March 12, North will be hosting the Color For A Cure 5K race. The price will be \$30 per participant and all proceeds go to Relay. On Friday, May 13, 2016, North will host their main event at the Gwinnett County Fairgrounds. The theme this year is "Cirque De Relay."
