Mark MacKain: All-In Futbol Club

His athletic abilities have earned him spots on Olympic soccer teams and awards worthy of national praise, but there are accolades and accomplishments that make All-In Futbol Club founder, Mark MacKain even more proud.


Growing up in Florida, MacKain played soccer at Winter Park High School. His soccer career began when he was just 14 years old – and a baseball player. MacKain, who is an excellent story-teller, recalls falling from a dead tree branch and hurting his hand on the way down. He remembers standing in front of his baseball coach, who was yelling at him for hurting his hand, and staring at his friends on the field playing soccer. It was then that he realized what he wanted to do with his life and what kind of mentor he eventually wanted to be. One of his mottos that he shares when he teaches new coaches is that "a coach can positively impact more lives in one year than the average person does in a lifetime." MacKain has done just that.

It is an understatement to say that MacKain has an impressive resume. He began playing professionally as the first high school student drafted to play soccer, more notably, he was only the fifth high school student to be drafted into any sport. He played for Atlanta's first soccer team, the Atlanta Chiefs, The New Jersey rockets, the Georgia Generals and on Olympic A & B Teams. He played for the National Youth Team, was inducted into the GA Soccer Hall of Fame, and was an executive director for Atlanta Fire for 21 years. MacKain was also elected to the US Club Soccer Board of Directors in 2009.

MacKain rattles through his soccer career fairly quickly saying, "I will tell you about all of this, but let me tell you what I am really proud of." MacKain points to a large check made out to

All-In Futbol Club members. MacKain and All-In raised \$325,000 in scholarships. "This is what I'm proud of." This isn't the only charity work MacKain does in the community. In 2014 he and his wife, Gina, established the Nicky MacKain Memorial Fund in honor of their son who passed away at the young age of 23. Nicky had a passion for soccer and a desire to help kids play. Over the past four years, the fund has donated over \$83,000 to families in need which has allowed children in over 350 families an opportunity to play the game Nick loved the most.

All-In Futbol Club was founded in 2014. MacKain credits Sugar Hill Mayor Steve Edwards and City Council for helping him to make it happen. The name was inspired by a church sermon about being "All in with no regrets." The logo, created by MacKain's friend and former Atlanta Chiefs intern Jon Katinsky, features three figures, representing MacKain's three living children; the soccer ball and 23 rays behind it represents his son Nicky. His family and his community are ingrained in his organization and his mission of giving back is evident. MacKain is humble and grateful, "When I see this, kids in All-In jerseys at the mall or wherever, and the Mayor and Council made it happen, that's what I'm proud of, hands down."

Sugar Hill Basketball Jersey Donated To Historic Preservation Society

1960s North Gwinnett High School student Jerry Pealock recently donated an old basketball jersey to the Sugar Hill Historic Preservation Society. A student at the time, Pealock found the jersey stored in a storage room in the high school sometime after Sugar Hill High and Suwanee High merged to form North Gwinnett in 1958. After some research, the society has determined that the jersey is likely from the 1940s due to the material and the manufacturer of the jersey. The number 23 was likely worn by several players as teams tended to use the same uniforms for several years.

Algie's House of Refuge Guiding the Homeless in Gwinnett

Gwinnett County has the third largest homeless population in the state of Georgia, with a school system that has approximately 1,943 known homeless students. Peggy Daniels, founder of Algie's House of Refuge, is determined to stop those numbers from rising.

Since 2010, Algie's House of Refuge has offered a variety of needbased services for hundreds of homeless men. The nonprofit focuses on giving shelter, helping with job searches and interviews, and supplying toiletries and clothing.

"They're very appreciative and glad to know that somebody is there to help. It helps with their confidence and their focus," said Peggy Daniels about serving and guiding the Gwinnett County homeless population.

Algie's House is in need of supply donations including toiletry items, clothes, linens, towels, pens and pencils, computers, printers, and copy paper. Monetary donations an also be made through Facebook. With all of these items, a storage facility is also needed to store and organize items. Volunteers are always welcome to give their time, skills, and counseling.

Daniels' vision for Algie's House is to have it's own temporary housing facility in the near future. The nonprofit is currently seeking monetary donations to purchase a facility to give the men a home while they seek employment.


